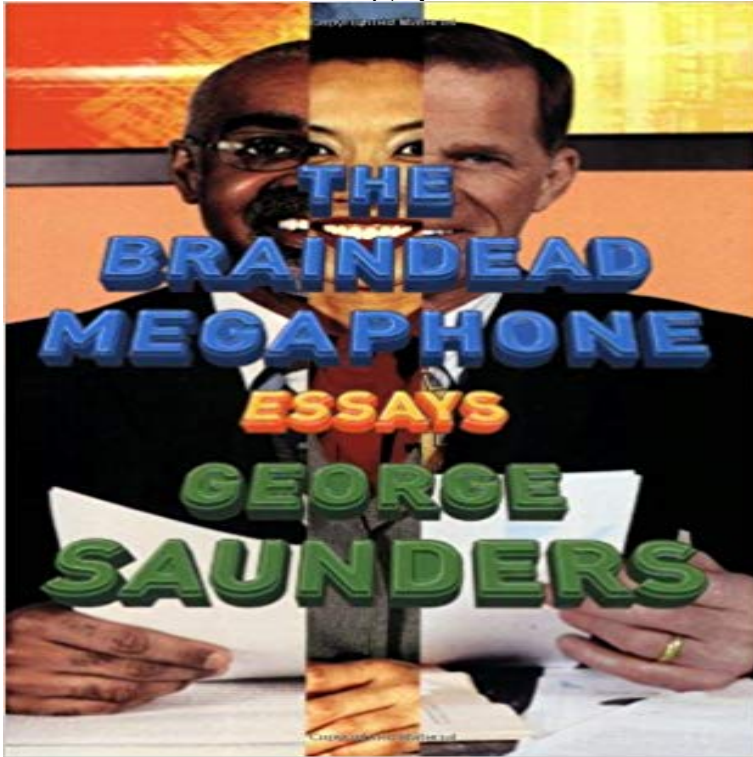


The Braindead Megaphone
